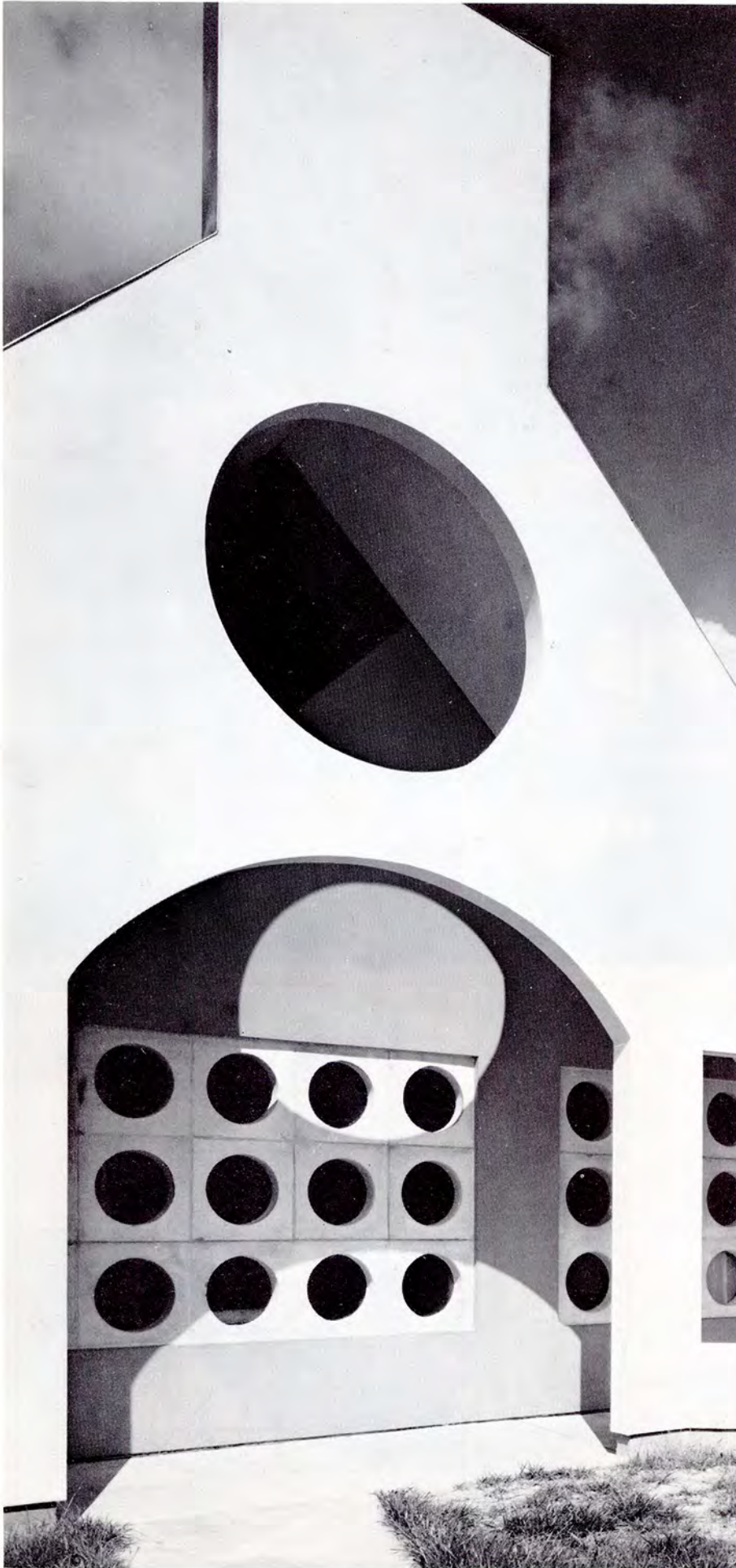

The design awards jury this year felt the entries exhibited high competence in dealing with programs and formal issues. Execution of the projects was of very exceptional quality in comparison with other states' work. Most of the projects had a modest budget, which is a sign of the times.

The jury felt architects should take the design awards very seriously because design is what they do that is unique among the professions. Entries should use only top notch slides and drawings, all of which should be set up in a sequence to clearly show the design concept. Too many entries had slides of unfinished, empty, open spaces. Even if it means waiting a year, a building should be shown in use with people and furnishings.

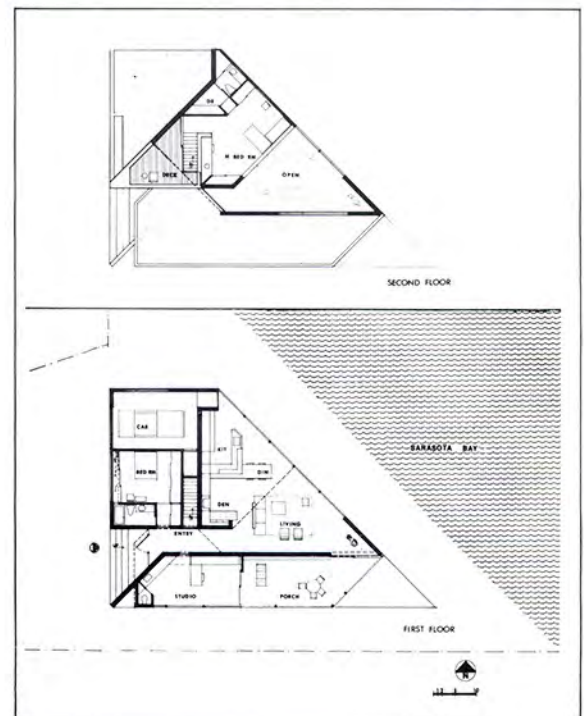
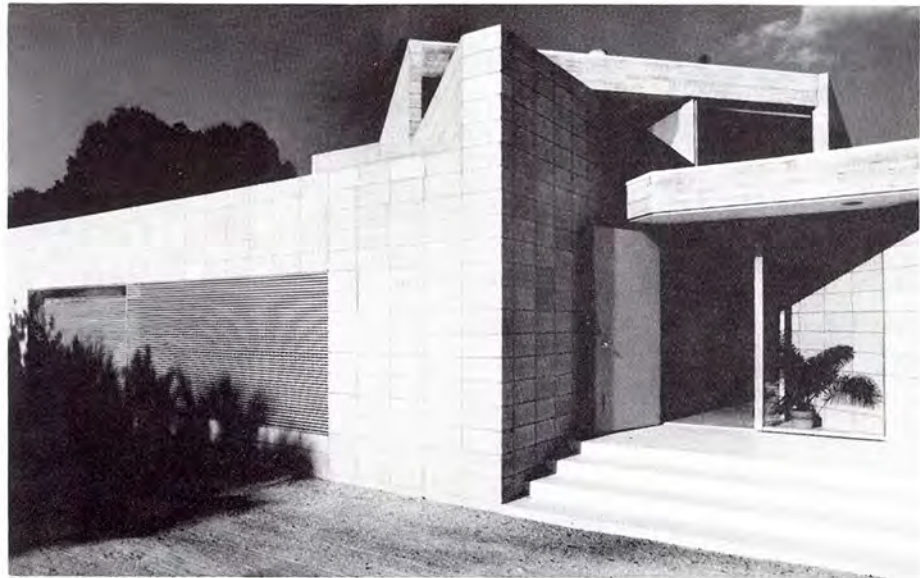

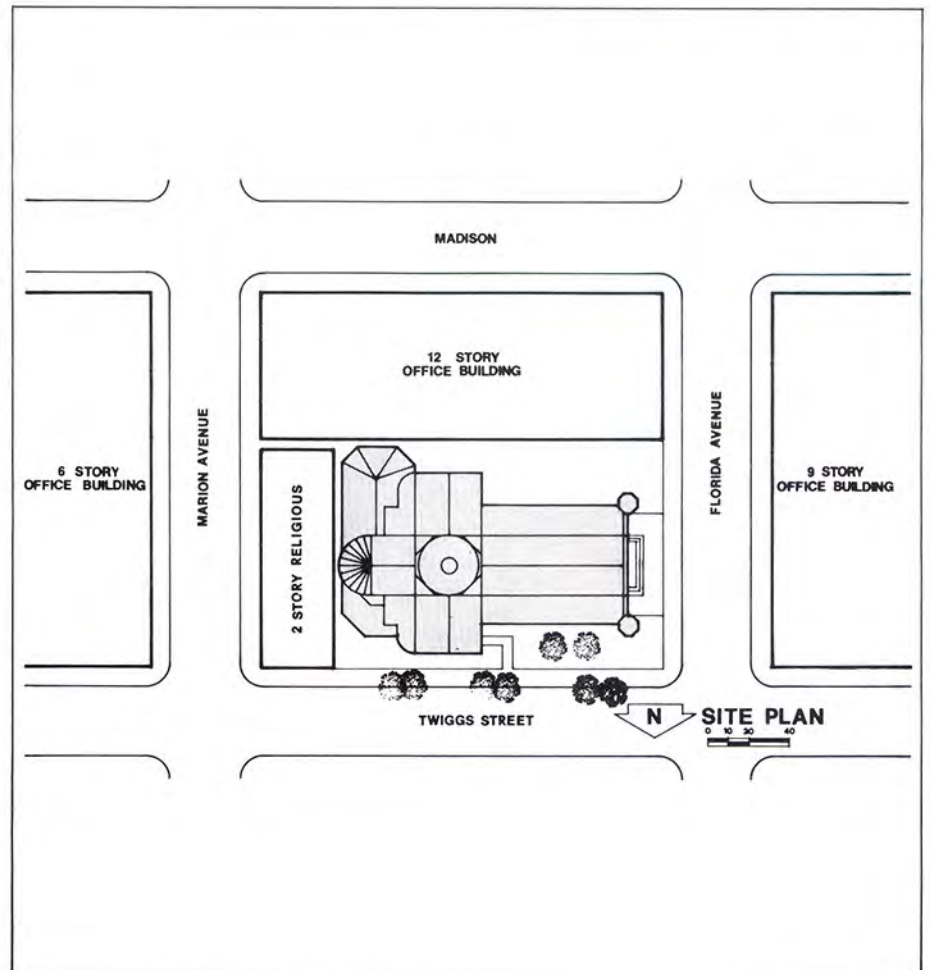
Jury Comments

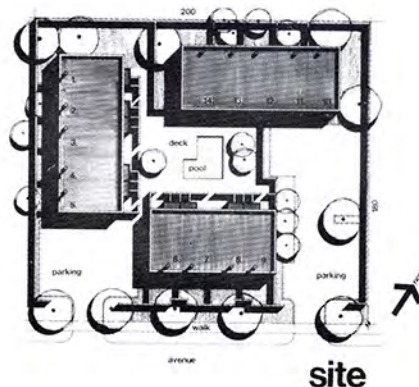

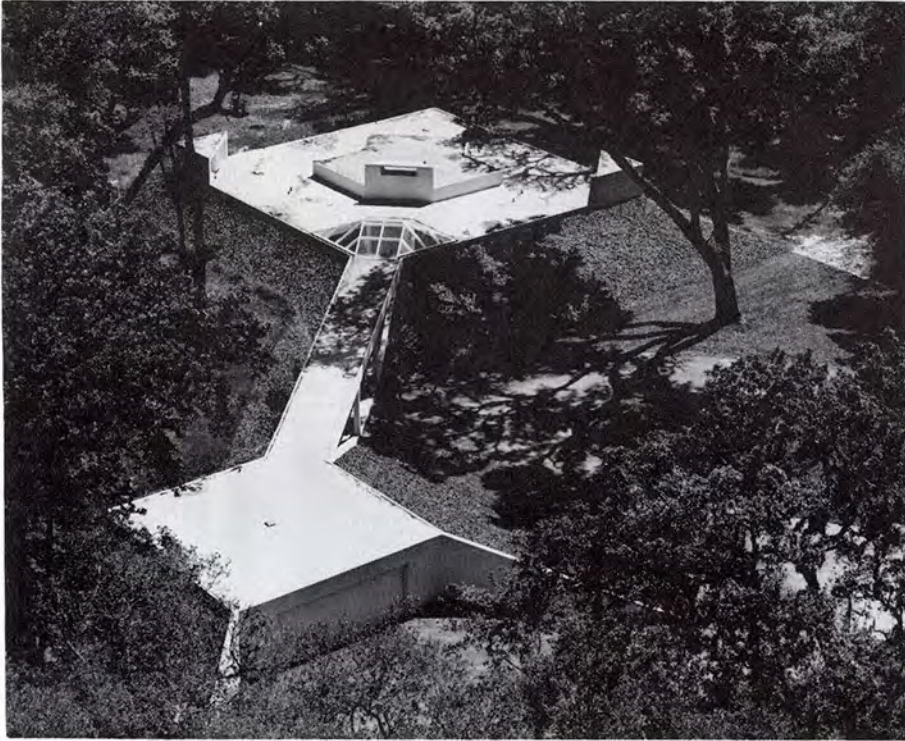

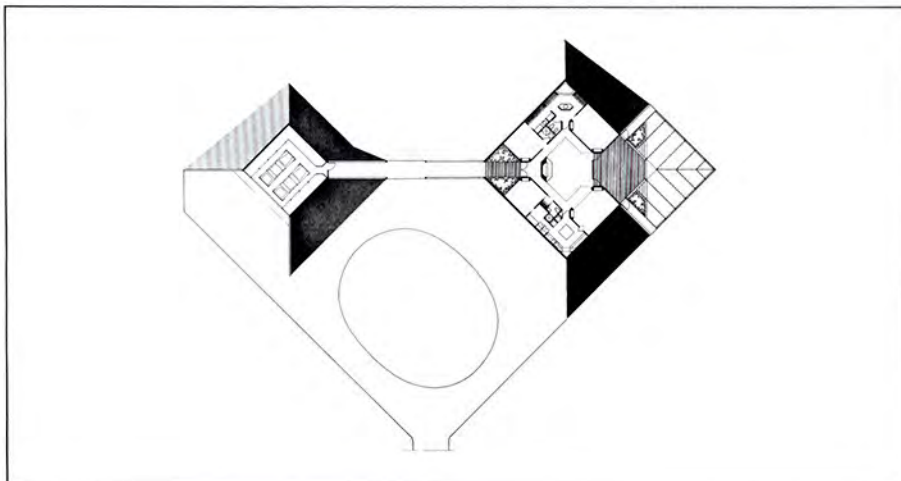
